Serving our community since 1921

Initially located above the Red & White Store, the Berkshire Free Library was established by NYS charter in 1921, with 95 families joining in its first year. Its first librarian was Emma Bradley Andrews Payne (1857-1926), and following her death, her home was donated by her daughter, Miriam Alathea Payne Patch (1883-1964) to become the new home of the library. Miriam Patch was very active in the Berkshire Reading Club and was the first President of the Board of Trustees of the Berkshire Free Library Association. Descendants of Emma Bradley Andrews Payne and Miriam Payne Patch, a number of whom still live in the area, continue to support of the library and its activities.
